

What Brings \$521,300,000 to Tampa Bay?

ourism...the Port...Phosphate... Citrus...Construction...These are some of the industries that come to mind when we think about the ones that contribute significantly to our local economy.

It is time to add a new industry to that list, an industry that brings over \$521.3 million annually to our region. Not only does this industry pump a significant amount of money into our local economy, it provides a diversity of benefits to add to the quality of life in Tampa Bay.

This major industry is THE ARTS. The Tampa Bay Business Committee for the Arts, Inc. ("TBBCA") recently announced the results of a professional study of the economic impact of the arts in Hillsborough and Pinellas counties. This is the first measure of arts impact on the two counties since the original joint study conducted in 1999. The report was sponsored by PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP, and conducted by the PwC Sports, Convention and Leisure Practice.

The findings were presented to government and business leaders and the press on January 31st at Tampa International Airport. Representatives of PricewaterhouseCoopers, including partner David Zimmerman, Rob Canton (Project Director) and Nilgun Kamp (Project Manager), presented the details of the study results. Executive directors of the region's arts and cultural institutions, as well as representatives of local government were present to respond to the findings.

The study quantified the arts as an industry and determined that they are certainly not a drain on the economy; they are in fact a key component of economic development. The arts are clearly a major contributor to the economic and social health of the entire region.

Key findings include the fact that not only do the arts have an economic impact of \$521.3 million annually; they also provide 7,800 jobs and \$147 million in payroll. In terms of attendance, the study found that 5.6 million visits were made to non-profit arts and cultural institutions in a single year. To put this number in perspective, for the same year, the attendance figure for the area's sports events (including the Buccaneers, Devil Rays, Lightning, Mutiny, USF Football and Basketball, and the Outback Bowl) is 3.3 million! The Super Bowl Task Force predicted an economic impact of the Super Bowl at \$250 million. Experts have debated whether the true impact was that high. Yet there is a more important thing to note. The arts have a much greater impact on the economy EVERY year, not just one of the rare years that a big football game is played here.

From the Desk of Sheriff Jim Coats

recent occurrences around the Tampa Bay area I find it necessary to once again remind Pinellas County residents of the need to be vigilant

against distraction type thefts. Over the past few years several different versions of this crime have occurred in our area, but all involve a suspect creating some type of diversion as an accomplice enters a residence to commit a theft.

Common diversions include a suspect who poses as a utility worker or private contractor who arrives at a residence without an appointment to test water quality, water pressure, the condition of sewer lines, or to verify the accuracy of property lines. In reality this person is responsible for luring the victim outside, or to keep them distracted in a specific nor your belongings are safe. location within their home as another suspect surreptitiously enters. Once inside the home the second suspect searches quickly for cash, jewelry, or

noticed. When the theft is complete, the first suspect concludes the "test" being performed, or makes an excuse that allows him or her to leave the scene and is never heard from again. In some cases the theft is detected minutes after it has occurred, however in most cases it is not discovered for an extended period of time.

Historically suspects who commit this type of crime have targeted the elderly when selecting a victim. The reasons for this vary, but our elderly residents are not the only people susceptible to becoming a victim of this type of crime. As Sheriff, I would like to remind everyone to use caution when approached by a stranger, and I strongly suggest that no one of any age should allow a stranger to enter his or her home for any reason without verifying a legitimate need for them to do so. It is very important to remember that once a stranger has made it inside, neither you

If a repairman or utility employee arrives unexpectedly at your door ask to show their identification and then have them wait outside while you verify that they The Way For A Safer Pinellas."

In light of some other valuables and leaves before being are who they say they are. If you are still not satisfied that the person is legitimately who they say they are do not let them inside your home and tell them that you will call to make an appointment for another time. If they do not want to come inside but instead ask you to accompany them outside, lock your door behind you and make sure doors and windows that are out of your view are also secure.

> Remember, if you believe someone is acting suspiciously you should notify the Sheriff's Office communication center or your local police department and report your concerns right away. If possible write down a description of the person you are reporting as well as any companion and include a description of any vehicle they might be using for transportation.

> Crime prevention begins with simple suggestions like these, but only you can make them work. As always it is our goal to improve the quality of life and to ensure the safety of our citizens by "Leading

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

"In these dangerous times people of all faiths must come together to educate ourselves and our youth in basic human rights. These






















Ninety-two arts and cultural institutions participated in the study, up from the sixty-seven, which completed surveys for the 1999 study. The earlier study found an economic impact of \$402.2 million — so the impact of the arts has definitely grown tremendously during the last few years. The multipliers used in the most recent study are much more conservative, which makes the results of this study even more impressive.

What do the results of this economic impact study mean? Money invested in the arts does not merely provide cultural enrichment, increased SAT scores, and the myriad of other benefits typically associated with arts and culture. Now it has been systematically proven that the arts have a tremendous, quantifiable,

economic benefit for the community. Money is not given to the arts; money is invested in the arts, an investment that yields valuable dividends in terms of economic growth and development to the region.

The arts reach millions of people and profoundly impact our local economy. They attract conventions and relocating companies to our area, as well as a talented workforce and tourists. It may seem crass to put a monetary value on an industry that enriches our lives in so many ways that cannot be measured by dollars and cents. Yet the arts have now been proven to be an engine for economic growth and development, and we must now view the arts as a vital agent for economic progress.

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












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Florida's Foster Care

Questionable "Care"

axpayers' dollars are allocated for the care of Florida's Foster Care children. Yet, what type of care are they receiving? Some would have us think that these children are prime candidates for mental health care, which translates to diagnosing, labeling and drugging.

In a 2002 article by Carole Marbin Miller of the Miami Herald, she reported "About 650 Florida foster children, including some not under the care of a pediatrician, have been given mind-altering drugs...Infants and toddlers were being administered the drugs, most of which the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not found to be safe or effective for children's use..."

Again, in 2005, Ms. Miller reported that, "Nearly 1900 children under the care of Florida's child welfare system are taking antidepressant drugs, despite a strong federal warning that such medications are linked to an increased risk of suicidal thinking among children.... Nearly 2100 children in care are taking powerful antipsychotic drugs."

Florida Department of Children and Families is entrusted with the task of protecting Florida's Foster Care children. We need to question the use of psychiatric drugs as a means of caring for children who have been removed from their homes. The nation's newspapers, leading authorities, and even parents are questioning the use of these drugs.

On Feb. 26th, 2008, numerous news articles were published that focused the public's eye towards the fact that antidepressants do not work. MSNBC published its news article, titled, Antidepressants may not help many patients: Researchers find placebos work just as well, except in severe cases. This article states, "Researchers reviewed published and unpublished U.S. Food and Drug Administration studies of the four of the most commonly prescribed new generation antidepressants to learn whether patients' response depended on how depressed they were to begin with. The studied drugs included Prozac, Effexor, Paxil and Serzone, which are all so-called selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors, or SSRIs. About 118 million antidepressant children is being monitored.

prescriptions were issued in 2005 in the U.S., according to the National Center for Health Statistics. The researchers found that compared with placebo, the antidepressant medications did not yield clinically significant improvements in depression in patients who initially had moderate or even very severe depression."

David Barlow, founder and Director Emeritus for the Center for Anxiety and Related Disorders at Boston University is quoted as saying "The take-home message is there are probably too many people on medications who might not need to be on these medications...Patients taking the drugs should not stop without consulting a doctor", Barlow cautioned, "but they might consider non-medical therapies before beginning or continuing the medication"

The Guardian published an article titled, Prozac, used by 40m people, does not work say scientists: Analysis of unseen trials and other data concludes it is no better than placebo. In this report it states "Prozac, the bestselling antidepressant taken by 40 million people worldwide, does not work and nor do similar drugs in the same class, according to a major review released today."

It is up to the taxpayers to question this practice of administering psychiatric drugs to the children under custody of the state. It is up to us to ask our legislators what they are going to do about monitoring the escalating use of these drugs on children who are removed from their parents. Every resident of Florida has the ability to question this and help to protect these

The Annual Report to the Senate Committee on Children and Families, entitled Ensuring Appropriate and Informed Use of Psychotherapeutic Medications for Florida's Children in the Department of Children and Families Care and Custody, May 2007, was submitted to the Senate Committee on Children and Families. This was a follow-up to a 2005 update. For some, this may appear as though the use of psychotropic drugs on Florida's Foster

Yet, when you look further into this report, it clearly states that the report only covers the periods of September-November of the years 2004-2006.

Looking at the Annual Report to the Senate Committee, it states that "11.3 percent of all children (ages 0-17) in the Department's care and custody were prescribed one or more psychotherapeutic medications... Two percent of children ages 0-5 were prescribed one or more psychotherapeutic medications during the same three-month period in 2006." This is only for a 3-month period, as noted above. Antidepressants, anti-anxiety drugs, anti-convulsants and anti-psychotics are being administered to our Florida's Foster Care children without bona-fide evidence of workability. With the latest news on Antidepressants not being effective, with the FDA warnings on all psychotropic drugs, we have to ask ourselves, "How are we going to actually protect our Foster Care children?" Every tax-paying Florida resident has the responsibility to ask themselves and their legislators that question. Infants less than a year old are included in this category of children who are being put on mind-altering drugs that carry heavy FDA warnings, some of which are, suicidal thoughts, mania, hallucinations, aggression, diabetes, heart trouble and sudden death.

In the Philadelphia Inquirer, on Feb. 17, 2008, Karl Stark wrote an in-depth report titled Tarnished View of Wonder Drug. This article tells the story of several children who were placed on anti-psychotics and the adverse reactions they experienced. He reports "Tammy Wandling of West Virginia hired legal counsel in Philadelphia after son Austin developed a growth in his breast while taking Risperdal for autism..."John Huff of Pleasantville, N.J., required surgery to remove the femalesize breasts he developed at 14 while on Risperdal".

A Daytona Beach News Journal Report, by Mary Moewe, Florida Undecided As State Sues Over Costly Drug Problem, Jan. 10, 2008 states, "Another Sanford parent, Richard Davis, said he watched Florida's toll free Hotline 1-800-782-2878. in horror as his daughter Ciara, then 6, gained 40 pounds, developed breasts

and had uncontrollable tongue and facial movements. "Those drugs were killing her," Davis said. Over his objections, he said Ciara was given anti-psychotics by her mother and while in foster care."

In examining each category of drug, and in examining the FDA warnings for each drug in each category, we still have to ask ourselves, "How are we going to protect these children?" The Report to the Senate Committee, dated October 2006, states that "An estimated 40 percent of the child welfare population meets criteria for a serious emotional disturbance." These drugs are being administered in an arena that does not have an adequate monitoring system and it admits "A panel of 25 experts was convened from June 9-11, 2006 in Tampa, Florida to formulate specific guidelines for the use of different classes of psychotherapeutic medications among children in Florida. The panel included national experts, representatives from the three academic Departments of Child Psychiatry in Florida, state public and private child psychiatrists, pediatricians with a particular interest in behavioral health, medical directors of prepaid public mental health plans in Florida and representatives from the state Medicaid Program." This is an obvious coup of those who have vested interests in the drugging of Florida's foster children. Psychiatry admits to no science behind the drugging of our population, no medical tests, and no chemical imbalance tests to prove that any one of these behavioral, mental or emotional "disorders" actually exist. Yet, a panel full of psychiatrists and Medicaid representatives can decide the "guidelines" for drugging Medicaid eligible children.

Florida's Foster Care children deserve care that will help prepare them for a safe and prosperous future. The adverse side effects of these drugs may inhibit or prevent that future.


